Sweet Potato Comfort Pie (SPCP) is a community-building organization that uses food traditions, the arts, and other creative forms of culture-sharing to spark connection, healing, and change.

Sweet Potato Comfort Pie obtained its official 501(3)(c) status in 2020.

HISTORY, FOUNDING AND CULTURAL CONTEXT

After the 2014 events in Ferguson, MO, founder Rose McGee sought to bring healing. She drew on her roots in southern Black food tradition, packed 30 sweet potato pies and drove to Ferguson. There she discovered the "power of the pie" to spark transformation, catharsis and human connection.



"IN RESPONSE TO" EVENTS

This discovery led her to the model of forging community connections in creative ways to help heal and connect people of all backgrounds. She returned from Ferguson, and SPCP produced the first Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Holiday of Service (January 2015). This event draws more than 400 people together each year to create an affirming and joyful space for the life-affirming work of racial healing. The organization's 10th annual MLK event occurred on January 19, 2025, drawing more than 550 people.

RESPONSIVE EVENTS LET US PROVIDE SPACE TO PROCESS AND DISCUSS CURRENT EVENTS AS THEY HAPPEN.

SPCP offers standard annual programming, as seen on page two.

- Hosted more than 40 responsive/pop-up events throughout the years and worked collaboratively with organizations and businesses to create community engagement
- St. Peter High School's Black Joy Day (Feb. 2024), during which we brought actors from the play to perform an excerpt and lead facilitated discussions about racial healing.
- Robbinsdale Area School District (Feb. 2024) for Black History Month events, Rose McGee baked the sweet potato comfort pie with the students and discussed the cultural history and power of this cultural food. Pie was served to all students in the district, providing a slice of representation and cultural celebration.

Other responsive events include:

- 50+ group sweet potato comfort pie bakes (generally in response to racial violence or traumatic events),
- 60+ Story circles
- 20+ "Tea parties" Tea parties honor the Black tradition of tea houses and ceremonies, which were safe places for African Americans in the early 1900s and throughout our country's history
