Minnesota House of Representatives Testimony for HF12

"Female sports team participation restricted to the female sex."

Chair Bennett and Education Policy Committee Members:

I am writing this testimony in support of HF12 that mandates that ONLY the female sex be allowed to participate in girls/womens sports.

Why do we have separate sports designated for females and males in the first place? Why was this ever started? There must have been a reason.

Might it have been to provide a more equitable basis for competition among the sexes? Meaning biological males that generally have higher muscle mass, more strength and weight should not be allowed to dominant over their female counterparts. HF 12 – Letter of Support

Hello. I am Laurel Audette, a ninth-grade student from Saint Paul. Thank you for having me here today. I was disappointed to hear that Minnesota has decided to reject the Executive Order addressing transgender athletes competing in sports. This bill is necessary to protect the fairness and safety of women's sports. Female athletes across Minnesota work incredibly hard to succeed in their sport, and for biological males to be allowed to compete alongside women in the same events and possibly come out on top, taking women's places is completely unfair and ruins the enjoyment of sports for women.

When biological males play with or against women, they will often also use the women's locker room, which is unsafe and puts women and young girls at risk. I had an experience when I was in sixth grade where I was changing in a college locker room after swim practice and a biological man who identified as a female walked in on me and came within 5-6 feet of me to grab something from a locker. While this particular event was not during a high school season, it could, and likely will happen to other high school female athletes if this bill does not pass. Speaking from experience, I was uncomfortable beyond words and I would not wish for any other young woman to have to have a biological man see them while they are changing.

In December of 2023, I was in a ski accident in which I broke 5 bones in my back, fractured a rib, punctured a hole in my lung, broke my thumb, tore my MCL, had a hematoma in my lower back, and had a subarachnoid hemorrhage. It was so severe I had to be taken by ambulance to one hospital and airlifted to another. I wanted to get back to swimming as soon as I could. A few weeks later, I got back in the pool, more for physical therapy than for practicing purposes. My practices looked a whole lot different than before, as I was only really able to kick with a board for the first week, and I could only do a couple of lengths before needing a break. Eventually, I was able to swim strokes and start training again, but my body had been through so much trauma, that my times in meets were only going up and my self-confidence was going down. I had lost so much of my technique and endurance, and I am still, a year later, working to get it back.

By the time I started my freshman swim season, I was mostly recovered, however, my times were still not as good as prior to my accident. I worked incredibly hard during my season and finally started to see results as some of my times started to drop. I was able to make the Section team, but despite my hard work, I did not make it to state this year. I have seen my 2 older brothers swim at the state meet and it has become a goal of mine to eventually get there. I cannot imagine having a biological male swim against me and take a spot in the top 16 that get to go to state in an event after all of the hard work, time, and dedication I have given to overcome adversity. Males are scientifically stronger and faster than females, have greater lung capacity, and greater muscle mass. I would be absolutely devastated to see my dream awarded to someone who will always have an advantage over me, just because of the way God created us.

This spring, I am going to participate in track for the first time. While I have been a decent runner for most of my life, increasing miles and intensity in a new sport will definitely come with struggles. Watching biological males who may be new to the sport like me, finish above me and take opportunities from me would be very hard. I acknowledge the fact that there will always be someone better than me in anything I do. Other athletes beating me is not the issue. The problem is that I have no control over how my body is made, and if people who are built to be males are racing against me, it is a given, even if we are training at the same level, that they will have an advantage in winning and placing ahead of me. This fact ruins womens sports because why should we work hard to succeed when our achievements will just be stolen? For the safety and fairness of women's sports, please consider accepting this bill. My name is Erin B., and I am writing this testimony in support of Representative Scott's HF 12. I am not a lobbyist and am not representing anyone. I am a 3-time State Wrestling champ and was very active in the State Wrestling community in my younger years. Up until recently, Women's Wrestling was not a MSHSL sanctioned sport. This meant that if I wanted to wrestle, I had to wrestle on the only team available, which primarily consisted of men and boys. This was true of many other ladies that wanted to wrestle a few years ago.

While I appreciated the grace that was shown to me, and the kindness that was shown to me by my teammates, this was not an ideal solution for anyone. Young men going through puberty are building muscle even while sitting in class, whereas I had to work twice as hard in the weight room to build not even a quarter of the same amount of muscle. It is a simple fact that young men past the puberty age have natural strength advantages on young women. While wrestling has the advantage of being separated by weight class, not all sports can say the same. This can present a danger to young female athletes, who are generally shorter, less muscular, and with strength disadvantages to young men. I was able to make the choice to compete against and wrestle men, and I knew the risks and that I was at a strength disadvantage. If men are allowed to compete on female-only teams and in female sports, you are taking away that choice from women. You are subjecting them to natural physical disadvantages. You are potentially subjecting them to danger, and you are taking away a place that has historically been a safe haven for teenagers --- sports.

Minnesota has always been a haven for strong young women that want to play physically challenging sports and push themselves to be better. Minnesota was the first state to sanction Women's Hockey back in the 90's, and we had a very strong Women's Wrestling scene many years ahead of our upper-Midwest peers. In fact, back in 2001, the very first Women's Wrestling Fargo National Champion was a 95-pound wrestler from Royalton, Minnesota. Even now, we have a burgeoning push to get Women's High School Rugby sanctioned by the MSHSL. This Bill will not punish the young women that seek to play physical sports, but it will protect them on their female-only teams, and female-only spaces. Minnesota has always been a state that seeks to uplift and support our female athletes. I hope you all will support this Bill and continue that tradition.

I appreciate the opportunity to share my support for HF 12, and hope that Representatives will support this common-sense bill.

Representative Scott's HF12 protects K-12 female sports for girls and young women in Minnesota and is moving this week in the House. I urge you to support her bill and protect girls' access to athletic opportunities.

In 1972, Title IX paved the way for girls and women to have access to athletic opportunities, and athletics have been foundational to many girls' development as contributing members of society. Female athletes have received equal opportunity to compete on a level playing field since Title IX.

A quick scan of the internet finds pictures of some of the 2010's US women's soccer team standing next to tall, strapping young men. They're smiling, they're pointing at each other. They look like they just played a match. And they did. In 2017. Your purple-haired Megan Rapanhoe and the brown headed Carli Lloyd had their pictures taken with the slender guys they played in a scrimmage. That was just before the women's team won all the gold at the 2020 Olympics. The boy's team was the Under-15 FC Dallas team and the boys won! They're not 15! They're under 15! And the boys won! 5-2. They beat the best women's soccer team in the world!

The Minnesota High School Sports League rule that allows athletes to declare a gender, then join the team according to the gender with which they identify, not the one with which they were born. House File 12 would change that, restrict membership on a girl's team to girls. Real girls. Not adjusted or fixed or changed or socially appropriated.

Some examples come to mind. A young high school bowler on a recent WCCO interview admitted to being born male but insisted to the interviewer that he has the same DNA make up as a CIS-gendered girl. Because of this infusion of drugs or that surgical procedure. Bet he's got a mean hook. He also plays soccer.

Henry Hanlon is the captain and super-star of his California high school basketball team. At over six feet tall, he easily gets the ball at least half the time. He's a guy who says he identifies as a girl when it comes to basketball. In some games, he outscores the other team, by himself. Some schools in the same conference have forfeited matches, refused to play, because their girls wouldn't be safe.

Someday, a male pro-basketballer will make the leap. When LeBron James gets too old or has too many injuries to keep up with his younger team-mates and opponents, he hasn't thought it at least once. When he gets to be 50 or 60 or 70 and owns every National Basketball Association record for a man, he'll consider signing up to play for a WNBA. And claim a whole new shelf full of trophies!
